WOOLLOOMOOLOO BAY WATER-FRONTAGE COMPENSATION BILL.

Clause 1. It shall be lawful for the Governor with the advice of the Executive Council to grant to the several persons mentioned in the second column of the Schedule to this Act upon the establishment by such persons to the satisfaction of the Governor as aforesaid of their respective titles to the land in respect of which the portions of land hereinafter mentioned are authorized to be granted by way of compensation for losses of water-frontage the portion or portions of land set against their respective names in the said Schedule according to the respective areas and descriptions as set forth in the third and fourth columns thereof And each such grant of any of the said portions of land to any such persons or corporation shall be in full satisfaction and compensation for any losses whatsoever sustained by such persons whether in their own right or derivatively by reason of the reclamation of the land or any portion thereof described in the Schedule to the "Woolloomooloo Bay Land Reclamation Act of 1862" and shall operate as an extinguishment of any right title claim easement or interest of or belonging to the owners and of any persons claiming through or in trust for them or any of them of any land so severed from contact with the waters of Port Jackson as aforesaid and as compensation for which severances the aforesaid portions of land are hereby authorized to be granted respectively. (*Read.*)

Whosoever shall be convicted of murder shall be liable to suffer death *Provided that where the act shall not have been cruel nor committed with reckless indifference to life nor have been done with intent to kill or inflict grievous bodily harm upon any person nor in an attempt to commit or during or immediately after the commission by the accused of a capital offence or burglary or robbery or some offence obviously dangerous to life then it shall be lawful for them to find the accused guilty of manslaughter only.* (*Read.*)

And such Chief Commissioner shall for the purposes of such jurisdiction have and may exercise cumulatively with any powers now by law vested in him all the powers and authority possessed and exercisable from time to time by the Supreme Court or a Judge thereof and when sitting in Chambers such Chief Commissioner shall (in respect to matters cognizable by him in Chambers) have the same jurisdiction powers and authority as if he were sitting in open Court. Provided nevertheless that all appeals and applications in Insolvency to the Supreme Court or to a Judge thereof commenced or in part heard at the time of the commencement of this Act shall be proceeded with and determined as if this Act had not been passed. (*Read.*)

TELEGRAPHIC CABLE COMMUNICATION.

(Resolution.)

The Clerk having read the Governor's Message, No. 44, referred,—

Mr. Parkes moved,—That the Committee agree to the following Resolution, viz. :—

“Resolved,—

“(1.) That this House “approves of” the following Conditions of Agreement for the construction of a Telegraph Cable between New Zealand and New South Wales, and one between Normantown, in Queensland, and Singapore, as agreed upon by the Representatives of the Colonies of New Zealand, Queensland, and New South Wales, in Sydney, on the 14th February, 1873; and empowers the Government to enter into a Contract in conjunction with the other Governments named, upon the terms therein stated, for the purpose of carrying out this undertaking :—

‘Agreement.

‘THE following Conditions for the construction of a Telegraph Cable between New Zealand and New South Wales, and one between Normantown, in Queensland, and Singapore, are those which the Representatives of New South Wales, New Zealand, and Queensland agree to recommend their Governments to submit for the approval of their respective Parliaments :—

‘1. The three Colonies shall jointly enter into an arrangement for the construction of an electric cable to be laid between some point in New Zealand and some point in New South Wales, and also a cable to be laid from Normantown, in Queensland, to Singapore, the latter to be a through cable touching only at such points as may be agreed on, “and to be entirely distinct the whole distance from the line between Port Darwin and Singapore.”

‘2. The arrangement to be for a guarantee of five per cent. for a term not exceeding “thirty-five years,” upon a sum not exceeding one million pounds for the cost of the two lines. £1,000,000.

‘3. Twelve thousand pounds per annum to be allowed, to cover in full all expenses. £12,000.

‘All receipts above twelve thousand pounds to pass in reduction of the guarantee. The £12,000 contractors to retain receipts in excess of the guarantee; but if the profits are more than ten per cent. the Governments may require that the rates shall be lowered to amounts calculated to reduce the profits to ten per cent. 10 per cent.

‘4. The guarantee to be paid only whilst the lines are in working order: Provided that four weeks in each year will be allowed for repairs. If the New Zealand line only be in order, one-third of the guarantee to be paid; if the Singapore line only be in order, two-thirds of the guarantee to be paid. If the lines are not kept in order with due diligence, or if communication should permanently fail, the guarantee to cease.

‘5. The two lines to be commenced and constructed simultaneously.

‘6. The cost per message of twenty words, from New Zealand to New South Wales, 15s. not to exceed fifteen shillings; the charge for each word above twenty being nine-pence. 9d. And the cost for twenty words from Normantown to Singapore not to exceed forty shillings 40s. for the first two years, and thirty-five shillings afterwards; the charge for each word above 2s. twenty being two shillings. 35s.

‘7. Queensland to undertake to keep the land line to Normantown open for the use of the other contributing Colonies at rates not to exceed at any time seven shillings for twenty words. 7s. 20. ‘8.

- ' 8. The three Governments to act in unison, and to jointly arrange the details.
 ' 9. This Agreement, after being approved of by the respective Governments, to be
 ' subject to ratification by the respective Parliaments; and the details to be arranged in
 ' London by representatives appointed by the three Colonies.
 ' 10. The Governments will require to be satisfied that the contractors have made
 ' proper provision for the use of a through line of communication between Singapore and
 ' London.
